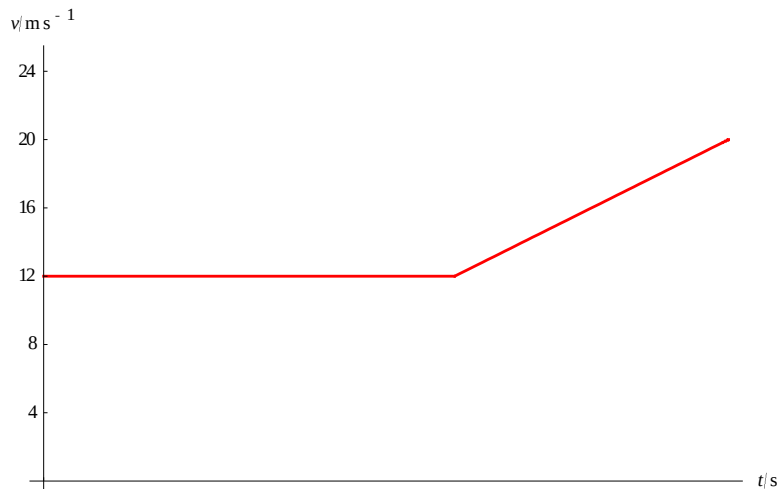

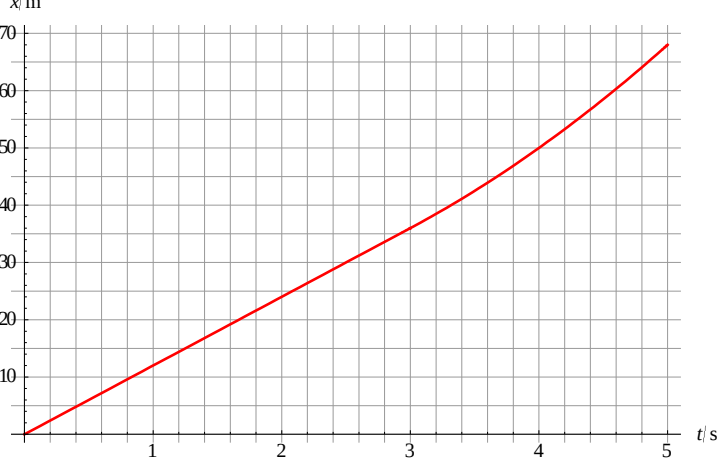

A car moves along a straight line with constant speed 12 m s^{-1} for some time and then accelerates at 4.0 m s^{-2} to a speed 20 m s^{-1} . The total distance covered is 68 m . The graph shows how the speed of the car varies with time.

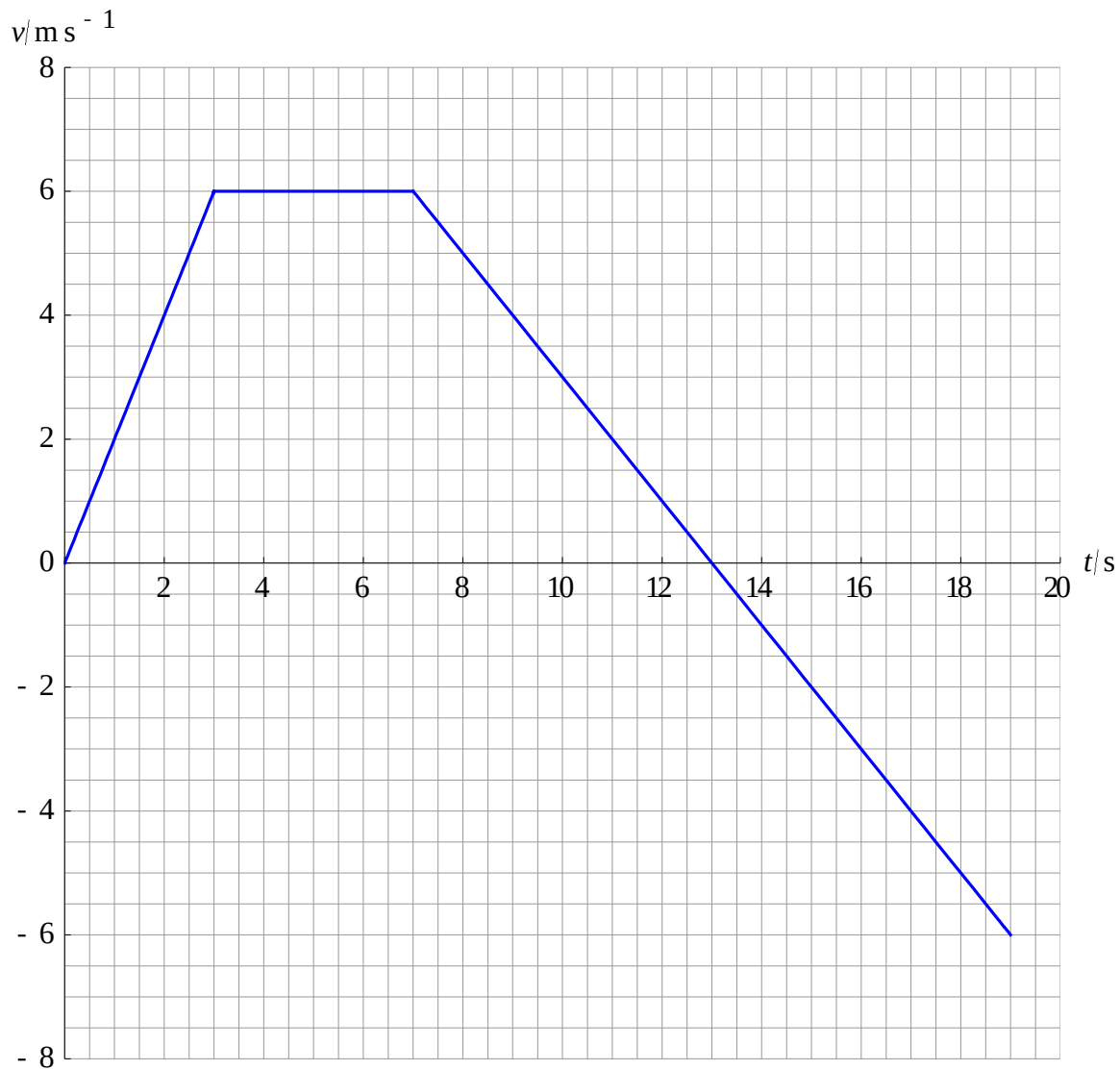


- (a) Determine the total time of travel. **[3]**
- (b) Sketch a graph to show the variation with time of the position of the car. Take the initial position to be zero. **[2]**

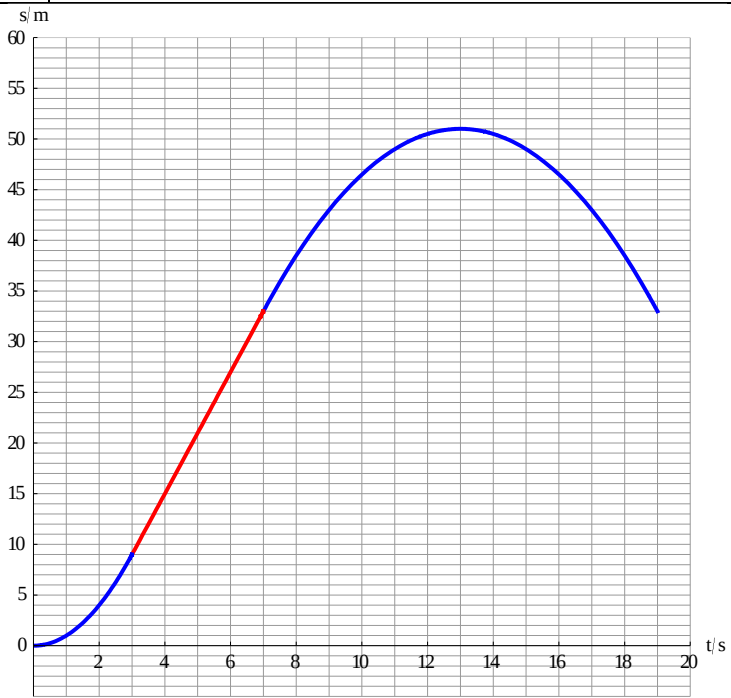
Question 1	Answers	Marks
a	$4.0 = \frac{20 - 12}{T - \tau} \Rightarrow T - \tau = 2.0 \text{ s} \checkmark$ $68 = 12 \times (T - 2) + \frac{12 + 20}{2} \times (T - \tau) = 12 \times (T - 2) + \frac{12 + 20}{2} \times 2.0 \checkmark$ $T = 5.0 \text{ s} \checkmark$	3
b	 Straight line up to 3 s $\checkmark$ Concave up curve for $3 < t < 5$ $\checkmark$	2

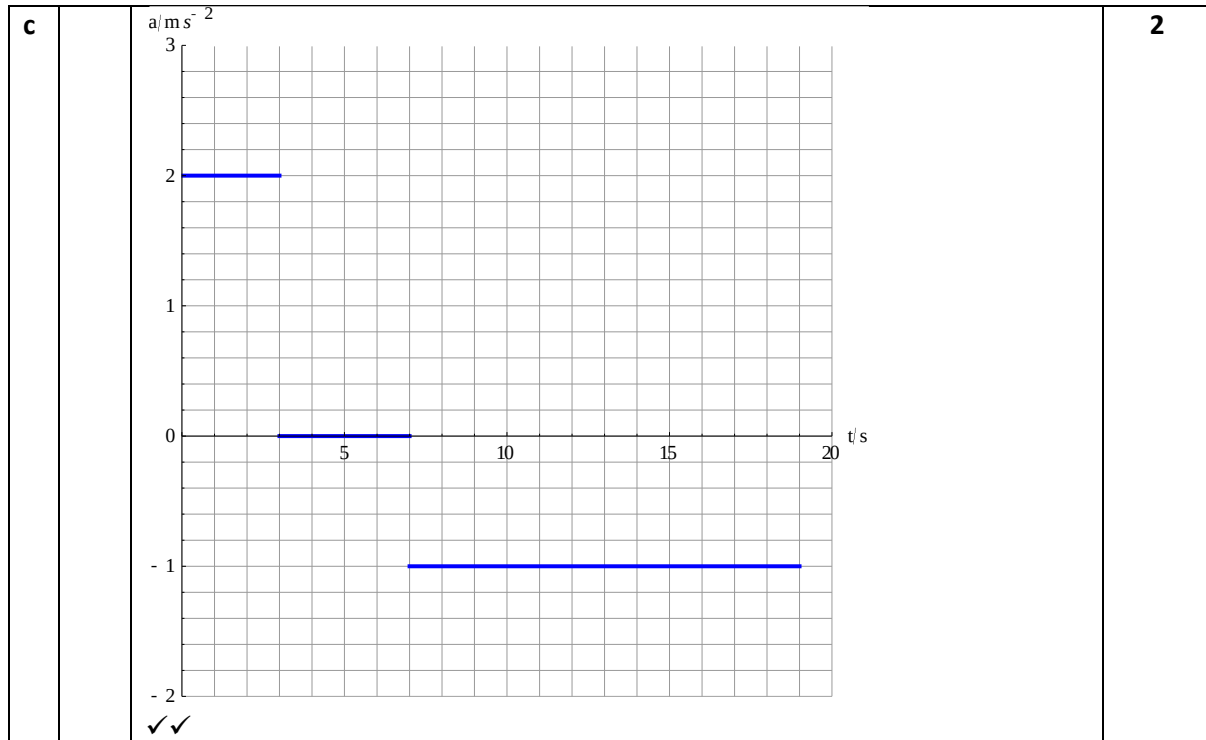

The velocity of an object varies with time according to the graph.



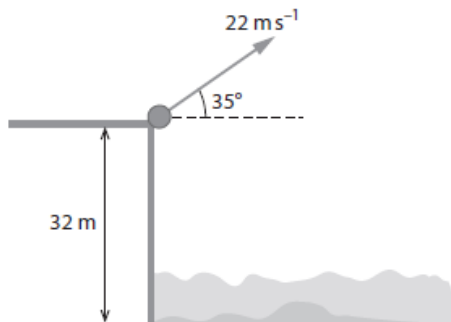
- (a) Draw the graph that shows how the position of this object varies with time. The initial position is zero. **[3]**

b	ii	$\frac{\text{distance travelled}}{T} = \frac{51 + 18}{19} \checkmark$ $= 3.6 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$	2
b	iii	$\frac{v_f - v_i}{T} = \frac{-6.0 - 0}{19} \checkmark$ $= -0.32 \text{ ms}^{-2} \checkmark$	2

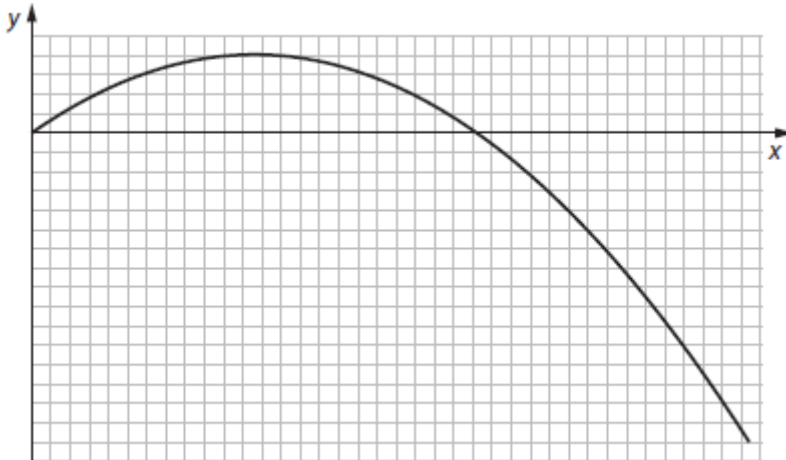

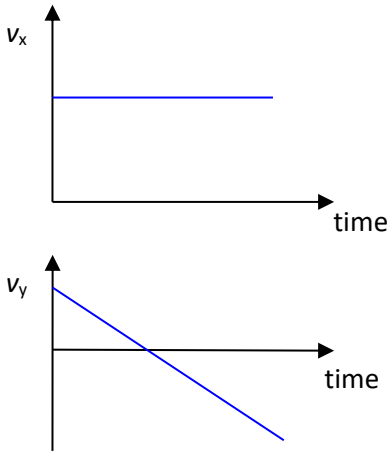
A stone of mass 0.20 kg is thrown with speed 22 m s^{-1} from the edge of a cliff that is 32 m above the sea. The initial velocity of the stone makes an angle of 35° with the horizontal. Air resistance is neglected.



- (a) (i) Determine the horizontal and vertical components of the initial velocity. [2]
 (ii) Draw graphs showing the variation with time of the horizontal and vertical components of velocity until the stone hits the sea. (No numbers are required.) [2]
 (b) (i) Calculate the maximum height above the cliff reached by the stone. [3]
 (ii) State the net force on the stone at the highest point in its path. [1]
 (c) (i) Using conservation of energy, determine the speed of the stone as it hits the sea. [2]
 (ii) Hence or otherwise, determine the time it took the stone to reach the surface of the sea. [2]
 The graph shows the path followed by this stone, until just before hitting the sea, in the absence of air resistance.



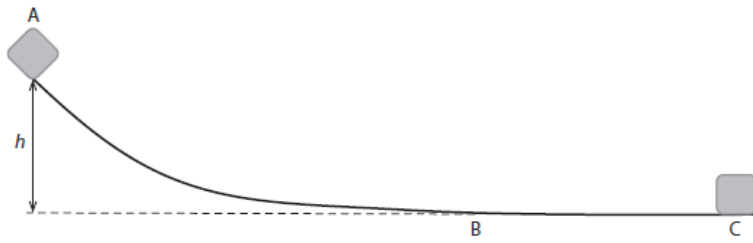
- d (i) Draw the path of the stone in the presence of an air resistance force opposite to the velocity and proportional to the speed. [3]
 (ii) State and explain one difference between your graph and the graph above. [2]

a	i	$v_x = v \cos \theta = 22 \times \cos 35^\circ = 18.0 \approx 18 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$ $v_y = v \sin \theta = 22 \times \sin 35^\circ = 12.6 \approx 13 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$	2
a	ii	 $\checkmark \checkmark$	2
b	i	At maximum height: $v_y^2 = 0 = u_y^2 - 2gy \checkmark$ $y = \frac{u_y^2}{2g} \checkmark$ $y = \frac{12.6^2}{2 \times 9.8} = 8.1 \text{ m} \checkmark$ OR $v_y = 0 = v \sin \theta - gt \quad 12.6 - 9.8t = 0 \checkmark$ $t = 1.29 \text{ s} \checkmark$ $y = 12.6 \times 1.29 - \frac{1}{2} \times 9.8 \times 1.29^2 = 8.1 \text{ m} \checkmark$	3
b	ii	The force is the weight i.e. $F = 0.20 \times 9.8 = 1.96 \approx 2.0 \text{ N} \checkmark$	1
c	i	$\frac{1}{2}mu^2 + mgh = \frac{1}{2}mv^2$ hence $v = \sqrt{u^2 + 2gh} \checkmark$ $v = \sqrt{u^2 + 2gh} = \sqrt{22^2 + 2 \times 9.8 \times 32} = 33.3 \approx 33 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$	2
c	ii	$v^2 = v_x^2 + v_y^2 \Rightarrow v_y = -\sqrt{v^2 - v_x^2} = -\sqrt{33.3^2 - 18.0^2} = -28.0 \text{ m s}^{-1} \checkmark$ $v_y = u_y \sin \theta - gt$ so $-28.0 = 12.6 - 9.8 \times t$ hence $t = 4.1 \text{ s} \checkmark$ OR Considering the motion from the very top: $y = 0 + \frac{1}{2}gt^2$ i.e. $8.1 + 32 = 0 + \frac{1}{2}gt^2$ $t = \sqrt{\frac{2 \times 40.1}{9.8}} = 2.86 \text{ s}$ so total time is $t = 1.29 + 2.86 = 4.1 \text{ s} \checkmark$	2
d	i	Lower max height $\checkmark$ shorter range $\checkmark$ sharper descent $\checkmark$	3

d	ii	Total energy will be reduced due to production of thermal energy✓ So at maximum height total energy is mgh plus the kinetic energy due to the horizontal component of velocity which has been reduced✓ will be less so maximum height will be less OR Range is horizontal velocity times time✓ horizontal velocity approaches zero✓ So range will be less OR The horizontal velocity component gets smaller and smaller✓ while vertical component approaches a constant value✓ Hence angle steeper	2
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4.

In a factory blocks of ice slide down a smooth curved path AB and then on to a rough horizontal path starting at B.



The length of the curved path AB is s ; the block of ice takes time t to move from A to B. The speed at B is v .

(a) Explain why, for the motion of the block from A to B:

(i) the formula $s = \frac{1}{2}gt^2$ does not apply. [1]

(ii) the formula $v = \sqrt{2gh}$ does apply. [1]

(b) A block of ice slides from A to B. The speed of the block at B is $v_B = 4.8 \text{ m s}^{-1}$. Calculate the height h . [1]

(c) (i) The coefficient of dynamic friction between the block of ice and the rough surface BC is 0.45. The mass of the block is 25 kg. Show that the distance BC at which the block of ice is brought to rest is 2.6 m. [3]

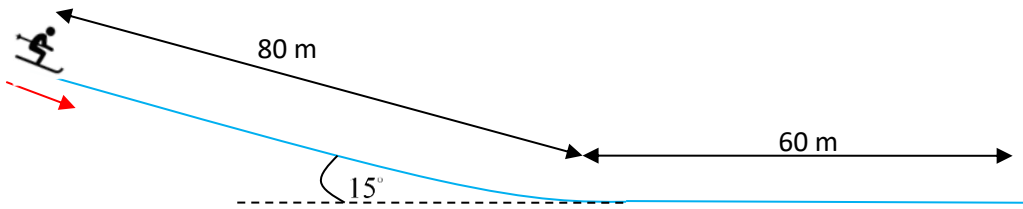
(ii) Calculate the time it takes the block of ice to cover the distance BC. [2]

(d) The factory also produces blocks of ice of mass 50 kg that slide down the same path starting at A. Predict, for this heavier block of ice, the speed at B and the stopping distance BC. (The coefficient of friction stays the same.) [3]

Question 4		Answers	Marks
a	i	The equation applies to straight line motion with acceleration g . Neither condition is satisfied here✓	1
a	ii	This equation is the result of energy conservation, so it does apply since there are no frictional forces present✓	1
b		From $v = \sqrt{2gh}$ we find $h = \frac{v^2}{2g} = \frac{4.8^2}{2 \times 9.8} = 1.176 \approx 1.2 \text{ m}$ ✓	1
c	i	The kinetic energy at B is $E = \frac{1}{2}mv^2 = \frac{1}{2} \times 25 \times 4.8^2 = 288 \text{ J}$ ✓ The frictional force is $f = \mu_k N = \mu_k mg = 0.45 \times 25 \times 9.8 = 110.25 \text{ N}$ ✓ The work done by this force is the change in the kinetic energy of the block and so $110.25 \times d = 288 \Rightarrow d = 2.61 \approx 2.6 \text{ m}$ ✓	3
c	ii	The deceleration is $\frac{f}{m} = \frac{110.25}{25} = 4.41 \text{ ms}^{-2}$ ✓ And so $0 = 4.8 - 4.41 \times t$ giving 1.1 s for the time✓	2
d		The speed at B is independent of the mass✓ $fd = \frac{1}{2}mv^2 \Rightarrow \mu_k mgd = \frac{1}{2}mv^2 \Rightarrow d = \frac{v^2}{2\mu_k g}$ ✓ and so the distance is also independent of the mass✓	3

5.

A skier starting from rest, skis a distance of 80 m down a slope inclined at 15° to the horizontal. After reaching level ground she stops after travelling 60 m.



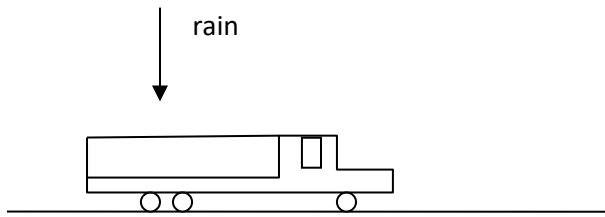
(a) Determine the coefficient of friction between the snow and the skis. [5]

(b) Calculate the speed of the skier when she reaches level ground. [2]

Question 5		Answers	Marks
a		The change in kinetic energy from start to finish is zero. Hence the net work done is zero ✓ Along the slope the net work done is $mgd \sin 15^\circ - fd = mgd \sin 15^\circ - \mu mg \cos 15^\circ d \quad \checkmark$ since the frictional force is $f = \mu N = \mu mg \cos 15^\circ \quad \checkmark$ Along the flat track the net work is $-\mu mgs \quad \checkmark$ and so the net work is $mgd \sin 15^\circ - \mu mgd \cos 15^\circ - \mu mgs = 0$ giving $\mu = \frac{d \sin 15^\circ}{d \cos 15^\circ + s} = \frac{80 \times \sin 15^\circ}{80 \times \cos 15^\circ + 60} = 0.15. \quad \checkmark$	5
b		For the flat track, $0 - \frac{1}{2}mv^2 = -\mu mgs$ and so we find $\frac{1}{2}v^2 = \mu gs \quad \checkmark$ and so $v = \sqrt{2 \times 0.15 \times 9.8 \times 60} = 13.3 \approx 13 \text{ ms}^{-1} \quad \checkmark$	2

6.

(a) A toy truck of mass 2.0 kg moves with constant speed 1.8 m s^{-1} on a horizontal road. When it starts to rain the truck begins to fill with water at a rate of 0.10 kg s^{-1} .

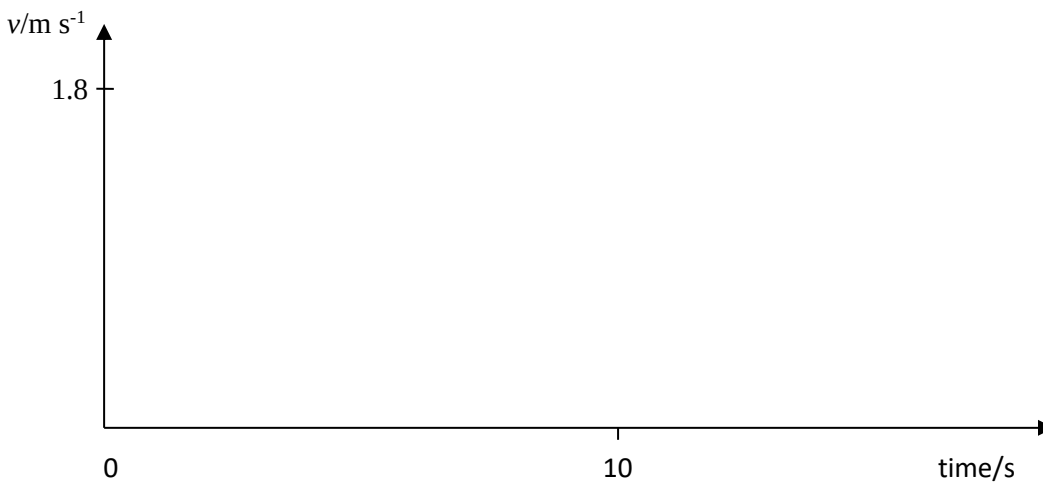


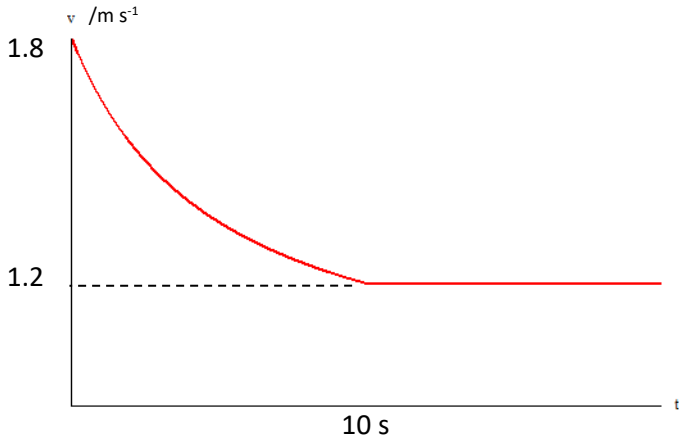
The truck begins to fill with water at $t = 0$ and completely fills after time 10 s .

- (i) Suggest why the momentum of the truck-water system remains constant. [2]
- (ii) State an expression for the total mass of the truck after time t ($< 10 \text{ s}$) [1]
- (iii) Find an expression for the speed v of the truck after time t ($< 10 \text{ s}$). [2]

(b) On the axes draw a graph to show the variation with time of the speed v of the truck.

a	i	There is no external force acting on the truck✓ In the horizontal direction✓	2
a	ii	$2.0 + 0.10t$ ✓	1
a	iii	$2.0 \times 1.8 = (2.0 + 0.10 \times t)v$ ✓ $v = \frac{3.6}{2.0 + 0.10 \times t}$ ✓	2
b		 Curve for $t < 10$ s ✓ Constant for $t > 10$ s ✓	2

7.

- (a) State the law of conservation of mechanical energy. **[1]**

A battery toy car of mass 0.250 kg is made to move up an inclined plane that makes an angle of 30° with the horizontal. The car starts from rest and its motor provides a constant acceleration of 4.0 m s^{-2} for 5.0 s. The motor is then turned off. (Use $g = 10 \text{ m s}^{-2}$.)

- (b) (i) Find the distance travelled in the first 5 s. **[1]**

- (ii) Find the furthest the car gets on the inclined plane. **[3]**

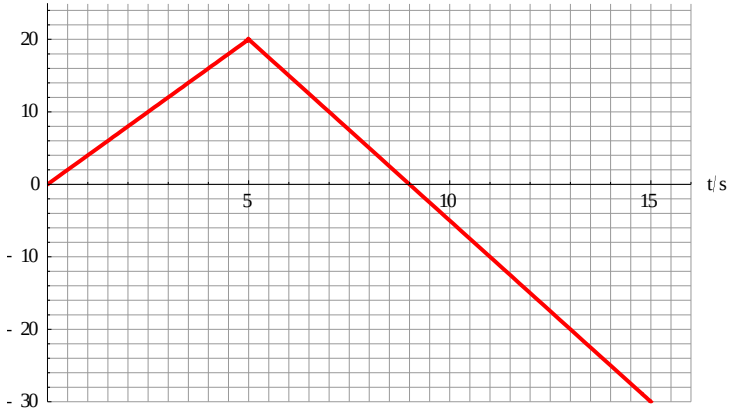
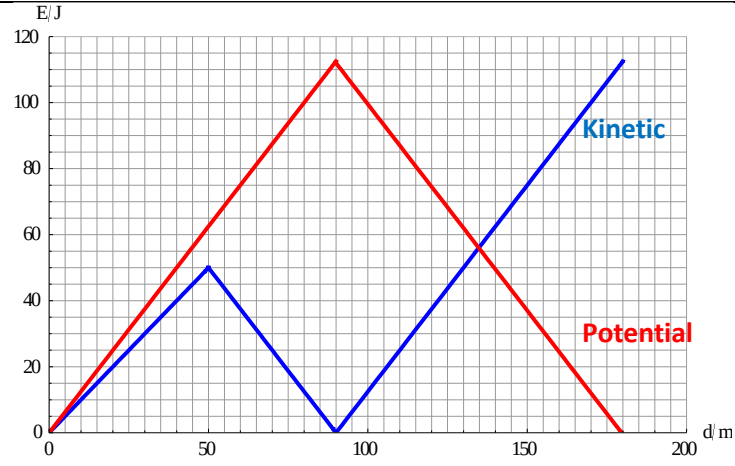
- (iii) Calculate when the car returns to its starting position. **[3]**

- (c) Sketch a graph of the velocity as a function of time. **[2]**

- (d) (i) On the same axes, sketch a graph of the kinetic energy and potential energy of the car as a function of the distance travelled. **[5]**

- (ii) State and explain the periods in the car's motion in which its mechanical energy is conserved. **[2]**

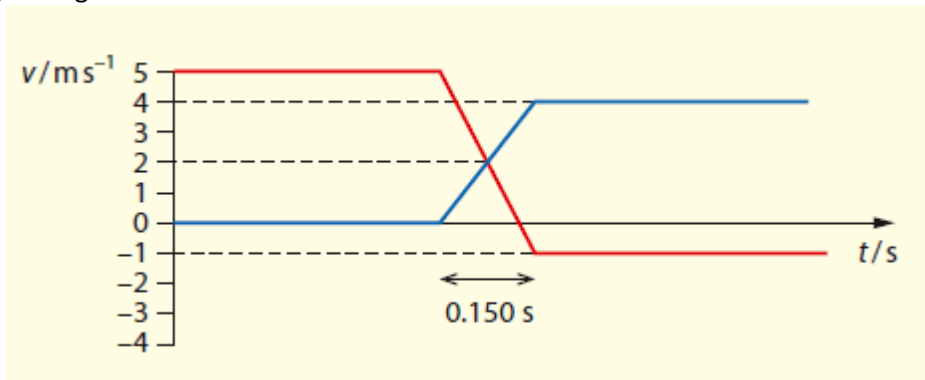
- (e) Estimate the average power developed by the car's motor. **[3]**

Question 7		Answers	Marks
a		In the absence of resistive forces, the total mechanical energy of a system stays constant✓	1
b	i	From $s = \frac{1}{2}at^2$ we find $s = \frac{1}{2} \times 4.0 \times 5.0^2 = 50 \text{ m}$ ✓	1
b	ii	At 5.0 s the speed acquired is $v = at = 4.0 \times 5.0 = 20 \text{ m s}^{-1}$ ✓ From then on the acceleration becomes a deceleration of $a = g \sin \theta = 10 \times 0.5 = 5.0 \text{ m s}^{-2}$ ✓ Then from $v^2 = u^2 - 2as$ we find $0 = 20^2 - 2 \times 5.0 \times s$ giving $s = \frac{20^2}{2 \times 5.0} = 40 \text{ m}$. The total distance up the plane is thus 90 m✓	3
b	iii	$90 = \frac{1}{2} \times 5.0 \times t^2$ giving $t^2 = \frac{180}{5.0} = 36 \Rightarrow t = 6.0 \text{ s}$ ✓ The car took 5.0 s to get to the 50 m up the hill. The remaining 40 m were covered in $0 = 20 - 5.0 \times t \Rightarrow t = 4.0 \text{ s}$ ✓ The time from the start to get back down again is thus 15 s✓	3

d	i	 $E_p = mgh = mgd \sin \theta = 0.250 \times 10 \times d \times \frac{1}{2} = 1.25d$ for $0 \leq d \leq 90$ ✓	5

		$E_p = 112.5 - 1.25d$ for $90 \leq d \leq 180$ ✓ $E_k = \frac{1}{2}mv^2 = \frac{1}{2}m2ad = \frac{1}{2} \times 0.250 \times 2 \times 4 \times d = d$ for $0 \leq d \leq 50$ ✓ $E_k = 50 - \frac{1}{2}m2(\frac{g}{2})d = 50 - 1.25d$ for $50 \leq d \leq 90$ ✓ $E_k = \frac{1}{2}m2(\frac{g}{2})d = 1.25d$ for $90 \leq d \leq 180$ ✓	
d	ii	The mechanical energy (kinetic plus potential) will be conserved when there are no external forces acting on the car (other than gravity) ✓ i.e. after the first 5.0 s or after the 50 m ✓	2
e		Kinetic energy at 5 s: $\frac{1}{2}mv^2 = \frac{1}{2} \times 0.250 \times 20^2 = 50 \text{ J}$ ✓ Potential energy at 5 s: $mgh = 0.250 \times 10 \times 25 = 62.5 \text{ J}$ ✓ Average power: $\frac{50 + 62.5}{5.0} = 22.5 \text{ W}$ ✓ OR Force exerted by motor: $F - mg\sin\theta = ma \Rightarrow F = ma + mg\sin\theta = 0.250 \times (4.0 + 10 \times \frac{1}{2}) = 2.25 \text{ N}$ ✓ Average power: $\bar{P} = F \frac{u+v}{2}$ ✓ $\bar{P} = 2.25 \times \frac{0+20}{2} = 22.5 \text{ W}$ ✓	3

8.

A train carriage of mass 800 kg moving at 5.0 m s^{-1} collides with a stationary carriage of mass 1200 kg. Both carriages are equipped with buffers. The graph shows how the velocities of the carriages vary before, during and after the collision.



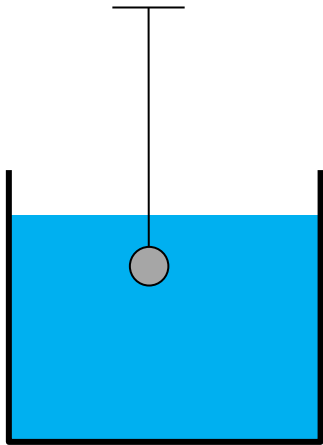
Use the graph to

- (a) show that the collision is elastic, [2]
- (b) (i) calculate the impulse delivered to the heavier carriage, [2]
 (ii) calculate the average force the carriages exert on each other, [2]
- (c) predict how the answers to (b) would change if the buffers were stiffer but velocities stayed unchanged, [2]
- (d) (i) calculate the total kinetic energy of the carriages when both have the same speed, [1]
 (ii) compare the answer to (i) to the total final kinetic energy and discuss. [2]

Question 8		Answers	Marks
a		Initial KE: $\frac{1}{2} \times 800 \times 5.0^2 = 1.0 \times 10^4 \text{ J} \checkmark$ Final KE: $\frac{1}{2} \times 800 \times 1.0^2 + \frac{1}{2} \times 1200 \times 4.0^2 = 1.0 \times 10^4 \text{ J} \checkmark$	2
b	i	$J = \Delta p \checkmark$ $J = 1200 \times 4.0 - 0 = 4.8 \times 10^3 \text{ N s} \checkmark$	1
b	ii	$F = \frac{\Delta p}{\Delta t}$ $F = \frac{4.8 \times 10^3}{0.150} = 3.2 \times 10^4 \text{ N on the 1200 kg carriage} \checkmark$ And so, the same on the other in the opposite direction $\checkmark$	2
c		Impulse is the same $\checkmark$ Force is larger since time interval will be less $\checkmark$	2
d	i	$\frac{1}{2} \times 800 \times 2.0^2 + \frac{1}{2} \times 1200 \times 2.0^2 = 4.0 \times 10^3 \text{ J} \checkmark$	1
d	ii	It is less $\checkmark$ The rest of the energy is elastic energy in the buffers $\checkmark$	2

9.

A small ball of radius 2.0 cm is attached to a vertical string and is fully submerged in a fluid.



The density of the ball is 2800 kg m^{-3} and that of the fluid is 820 kg m^{-3} .

- (a) Calculate the tension in the string. **[3]**
- (b) The string is cut and the ball moves in the liquid eventually achieving terminal speed.
- (i) Calculate the initial acceleration of the ball. **[2]**
- (ii) Explain why the ball will reach terminal speed. **[2]**

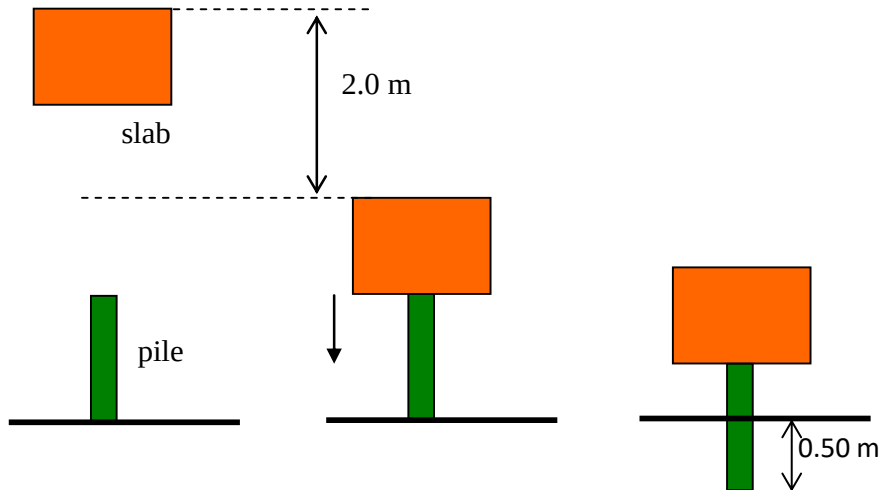
The viscosity of the liquid is 0.54 Pa s .

- (c) Determine the terminal speed. **[2]**
- (d) Describe the energy transfers taking place when the ball moves at terminal speed. **[1]**

a		$T + B = mg \Rightarrow T = mg - B = \rho_{\text{ball}} Vg - \rho_{\text{liquid}} Vg \checkmark$ $T = (\rho_{\text{ball}} - \rho_{\text{liquid}}) \frac{4\pi}{3} r^3 g \checkmark$ $T = (2800 - 820) \times \frac{4\pi}{3} \times (2.0 \times 10^{-2})^3 \times 9.8 = 0.65 \text{ N} \checkmark$	3
b	i	Initial net force is $0.65 \text{ N} \checkmark$ $a = \frac{0.65}{2800 \times \frac{4\pi}{3} \times (2.0 \times 10^{-2})^3} = 6.9 \text{ m s}^{-2} \checkmark$ OR $mg - B = ma \Rightarrow a = g - \frac{\rho_{\text{liquid}} Vg}{\rho_{\text{ball}} V} \checkmark$ $a = 9.8 \times (1 - \frac{820}{2800}) = 6.9 \text{ m s}^{-2} \checkmark$	2
b	ii	As soon as the ball begins to move it will experience a drag force opposite to the velocity $\checkmark$ As the speed increases the drag force increases as well eventually becoming equal to $mg - B$ / equal to $0.65 \text{ N} \checkmark$	2
c		$6\pi\eta rv = 0.65 \text{ N} \Rightarrow v = \frac{0.65}{6\pi \times 0.54 \times (2.0 \times 10^{-2})} \checkmark$ $v = 3.2 \text{ m s}^{-1} \checkmark$	2
d		Gravitational potential energy is getting transferred to thermal energy in the ball and the liquid $\checkmark$	1

10.

A slab of mass 54 kg falls from rest from a height of 2.0 m above a pile of mass 18 kg as shown in the diagram.



- (a) Calculate the speed of the slab as it impacts the pile. **[1]**
- (b) Calculate the common speed at which the pile and the slab move immediately after impact. **[2]**
- (c) The pile is driven to a depth of 0.50 m in the ground. Calculate the average upward force the ground exerted on the pile while the pile is driven into the ground. **[3]**

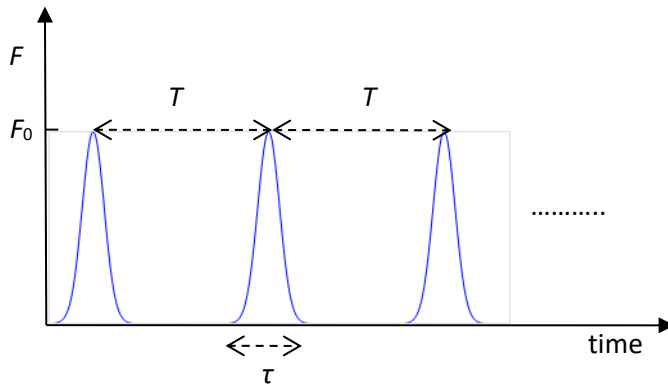
Question 10		Answers	Marks
a		$v = \sqrt{2 \times 9.8 \times 2.0} = 6.26 \approx 6.3 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$	1
b		$54 \times 6.26 = (54 + 18) \times u \checkmark$ $u = \frac{54 \times 6.26}{54 + 18} = 4.70 \approx 4.7 \text{ ms}^{-1} \checkmark$	2
c		The work done by the net force equals the change in kinetic energy and so $0 - \frac{1}{2}(54 + 18) \times 4.70^2 = F \times 0.50 \times (-1) \checkmark$ hence $F = 1590 \approx 1600 \text{ N} \checkmark$ The net force is the reaction from the ground minus the weight and so $1590 = R - 72 \times 9.8 \Rightarrow R = 2296 \approx 2.3 \text{ kN} \checkmark$	3

(a) Outline what is meant by the impulse of a force.

[2]

The net force F applied to a body varies with time as shown in the graph.

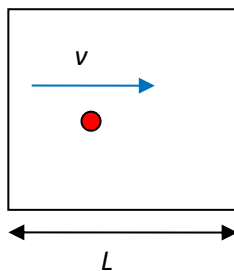


The area under each curve is J .

(b)

(i) Determine the average force exerted on the body during a time interval of τ . [1](ii) Show that the average force over an interval of time NT , where N is very large is $\frac{J}{T}$. [2]

(c) The graph might be used to model the force exerted on a wall of the container by a gas molecule. The diagram shows a molecule of mass m moving with horizontal velocity v . The molecule collides with the walls elastically.



(i) Calculate the impulse delivered to the right wall of the container by the molecule. [2]

(ii) Write down an expression for T , the time between consecutive impacts with the right wall. [1]

(iii) Determine, using the result in (b) (ii), the average force this molecule exerts on the right wall. [2]

a		Impulse is the product of the force times the time for which the force acts✓ It equals the change in momentum✓	2
b	i	$\bar{F} = \frac{J}{\tau}$ ✓	1
b	ii	A time of NT includes N impulses and so the impulse supplied is NJ ✓ The average force is then $\frac{NJ}{NT} = \frac{J}{T}$ ✓	2
c	i	Collisions are elastic so molecule bounces with same speed✓ $J = mv - (-mv) = 2mv$ ✓	2
c	ii	$T = \frac{2L}{v}$ ✓	1
c	iii	$\frac{J}{T}$, i.e. $\frac{2mv}{T} = \frac{2mv}{\frac{2L}{v}}$ ✓ $F = \frac{mv^2}{L}$ ✓	2

A toy helicopter has mass $m = 0.30$ kg and blade rotors of radius $R = 0.25$ m. As the blades turn, the air under the blades is pushed downwards with speed v . The density of air is $\rho = 1.2$ kg m⁻³.

- (a) Explain how the lift force on the helicopter is produced. **[2]**

- (b) (i) Show that the force that the rotor blades exert on the air is $\rho\pi R^2 v^2$. **[3]**
 (ii) Hence estimate the speed v of air when the helicopter just hovers. **[2]**

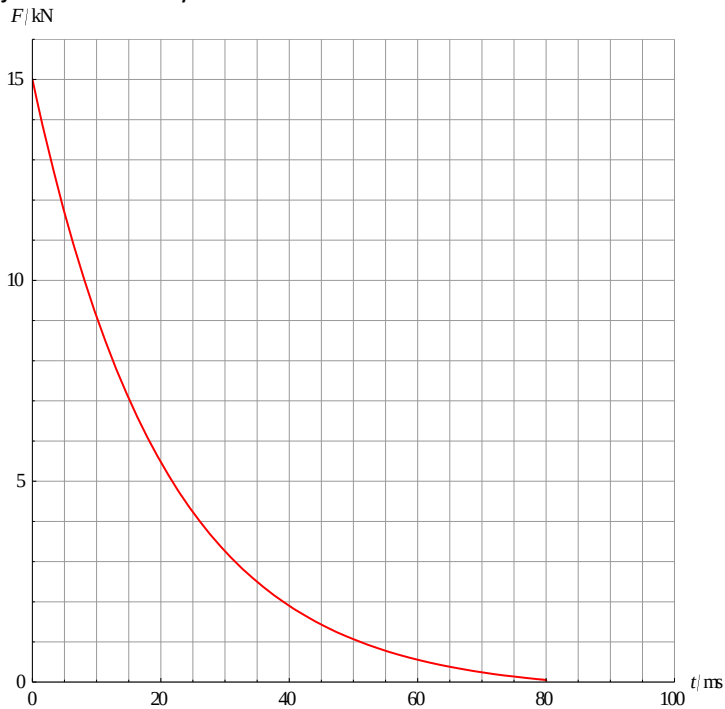
- (c) Determine the average power supplied to the air when the helicopter just hovers as in (b). **[2]**

- (d) The rotor blades now move faster pushing air downwards at a speed double that found in (b). The helicopter is raised vertically a distance of 12 m.
 Estimate,
 (i) the acceleration of the helicopter, **[3]**
 (ii) the time needed to raise the helicopter 12 m. **[2]**

Question 12		Answers	Marks
a		The rotor exerts a downward force on the air✓ The air exerts an equal and opposite force on the rotor✓	2
b	i	In 1 second the mass of air that will move down is $\rho(\pi R^2 v)$ ✓ Δp in 1 s is $\rho(\pi R^2 v)v = \rho\pi R^2 v^2$ ✓ and from $F = \frac{\Delta p}{\Delta t}$ this is the force✓	3
b	ii	$\rho\pi R^2 v^2 = mg$ ✓ $v = \sqrt{\frac{mg}{\rho\pi R^2}} = \sqrt{\frac{0.30 \times 9.8}{1.2 \times \pi \times 0.25^2}} = 3.53 \approx 3.5 \text{ ms}^{-1}$ ✓	2
c		In 1 second the rotor forces air of mass $\rho(\pi R^2 v)$ to acquire speed and so the kinetic energy supplied in 1 second i.e. the average power supplied to air, is $\frac{1}{2} \rho(\pi R^2 v)v^2 = \frac{1}{2} \rho\pi R^2 v^3$ ✓ So $\bar{P} = 5.18 \approx 5.2 \text{ W}$ ✓	2
c	i	The lift force is now 4 times larger since $F \propto v^2$ ✓ The net force is then $3mg$ since initially the lift force equaled the weight✓ $a = 3g$ ✓	3

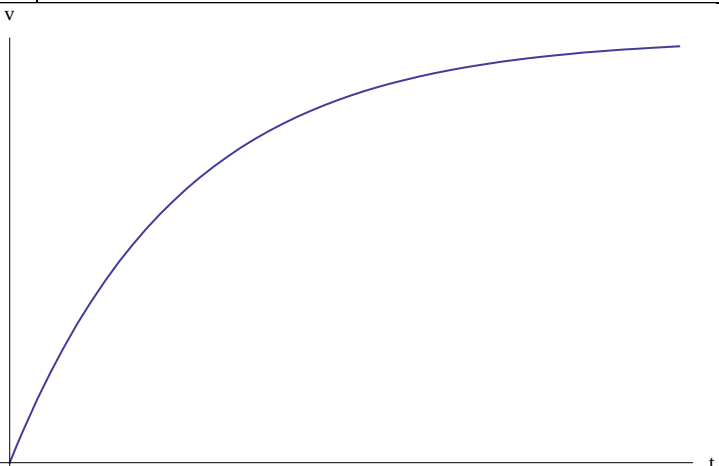
A launcher exerts a force on a projectile of mass 2.0 kg that varies with time according to the graph. The projectile is initially at rest.



- (a) Sketch a graph to show how the speed of the projectile varies with time. No numbers are required on the axes. [2]

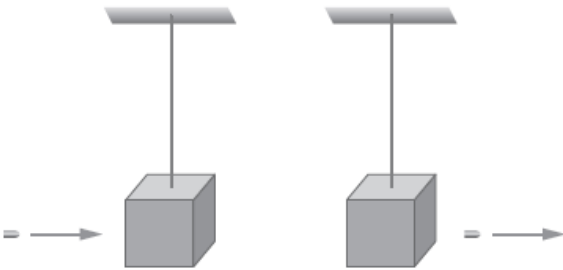
The projectile leaves the launcher in 80 ms. The impulse delivered to the projectile is 285 N s.

- (b) (i) State the area under the curve from $t = 0$ to $t = 80$ ms. [1]
 (ii) Estimate the average force exerted on the projectile. [1]
 (iii) Determine the speed of the projectile as it exits the launcher. [1]
- (c) Calculate the average power delivered to the projectile by the launcher. [2]
- (d) The average speed of the projectile in the launcher is 91 m s^{-1} . Determine the length of the launcher. [1]

a		 Correct curvature✓ Gradient approaching zero✓	2

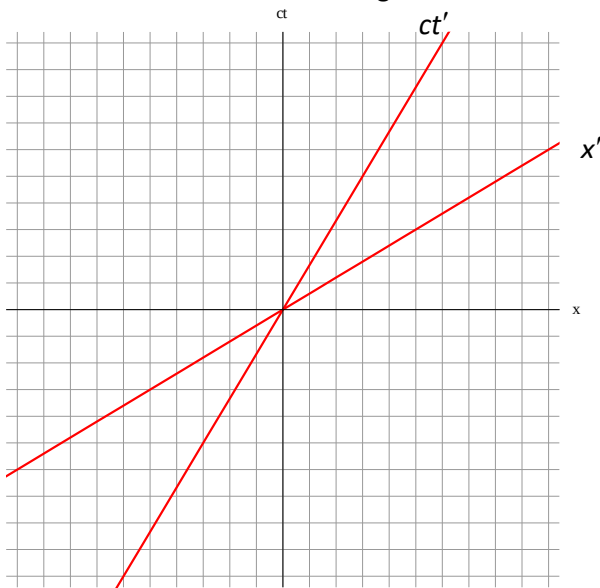


Two lights, at the back (B) and front (F) of the rocket, turn on at the same time according to rocket clocks.

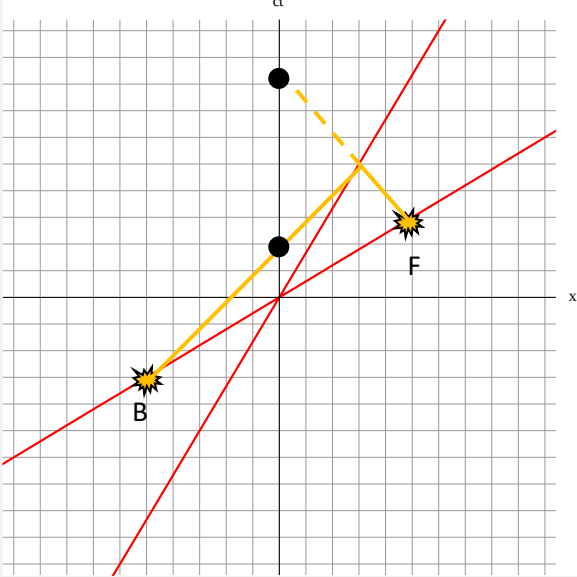

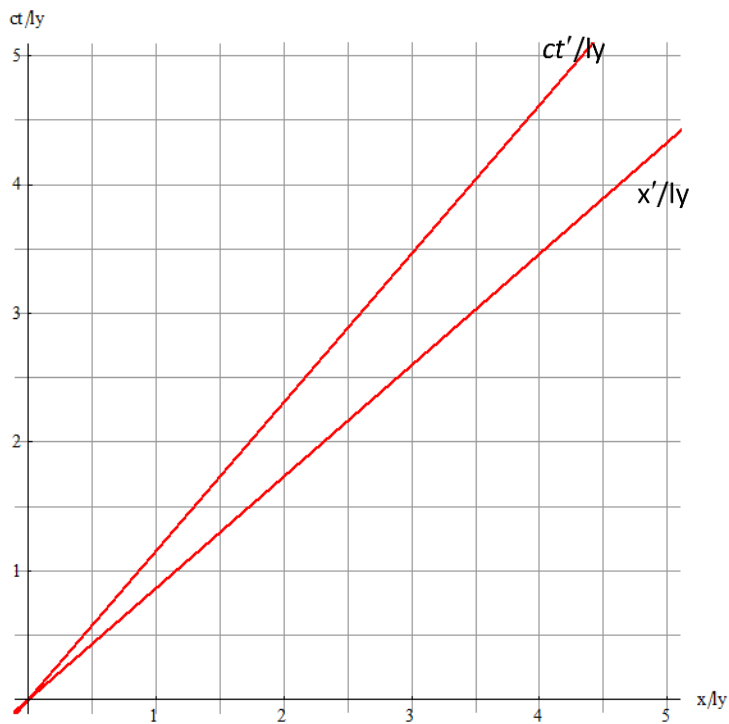

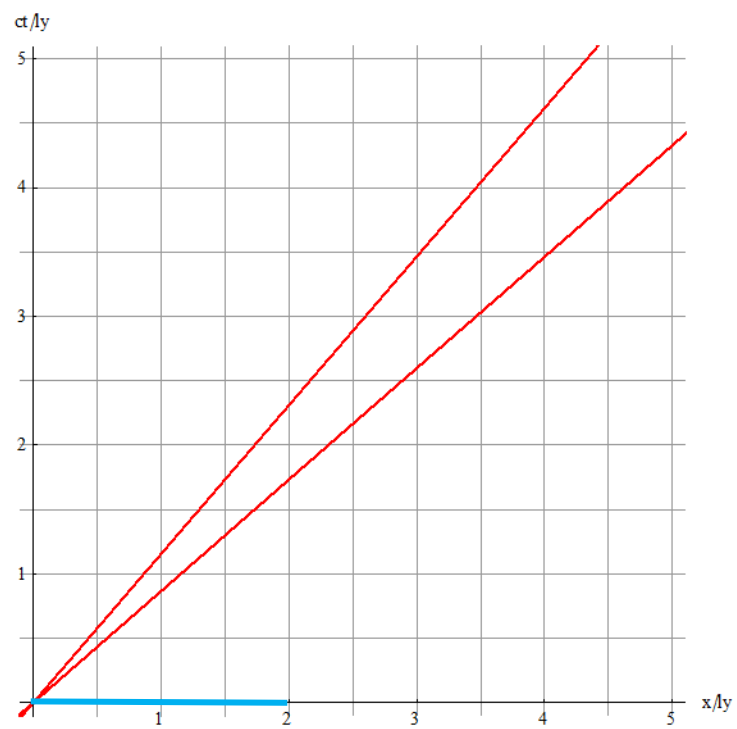

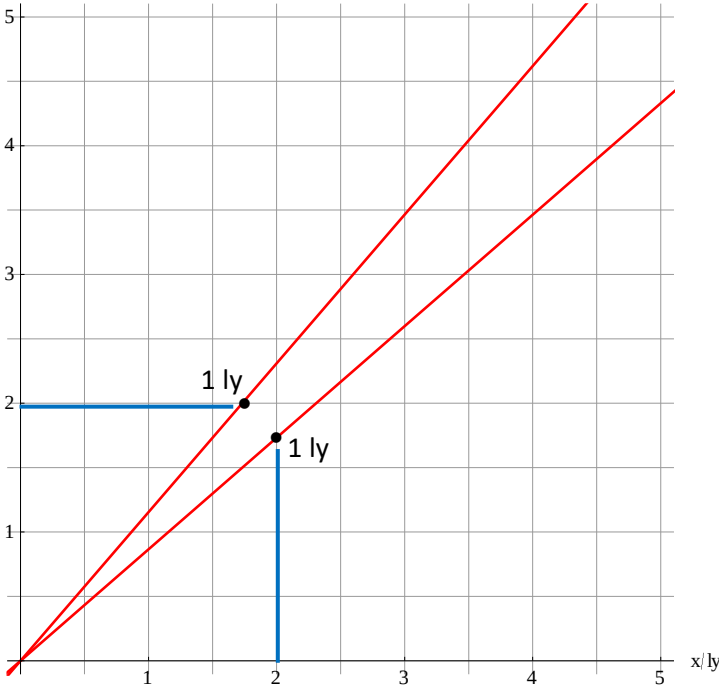

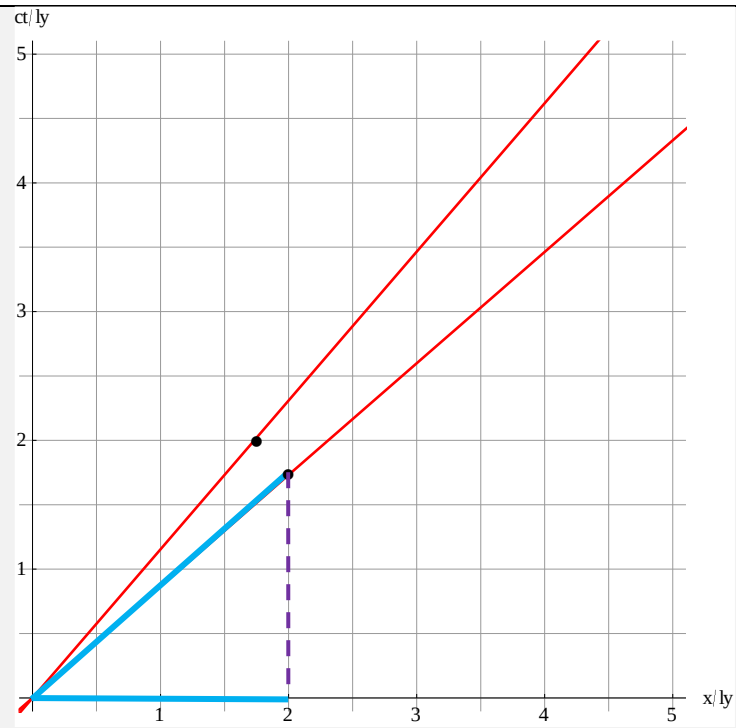
